The Department of Social Work and the Department of Teacher Education (B.Ed), HCC, in collaboration with *The Impact and Dialogue Foundation*, organized a screening of the documentary film *Traded* on the issue of human trafficking, followed by an awareness session titled "Raise Awareness on Empowering Women to Improve the Effectiveness of Anti-Human Trafficking" on March 12, 2025.

- 1. **Ms. Pallabi Ghosh** Founder of *Impact and Dialogue Foundation*.

- 3. **Anisha Aktar** Youth Coordinator & Communication In-charge of the Student Awareness Workshop.
- 4. **Dr. H.C. Dsouza** Director, TFI, and Psychologist.

The program began with an introductory speech by Ms. Lily Jamatia, Assistant Professor in the Department of Social Work, followed by the MCs, Khachang Jamatia (B.Ed) and Rikbith D. Sangma (BSW). The event concluded with a vote of thanks by Mr. Joshiah Rupini.

Following the screening, there was an interactive session with **Ms. Pallabi Ghosh**, Founder and Director of *Impact and Dialogue Foundation*, and **Mr. Harshit Bawa**, Director of the film, discussing the documentary.

Traded, directed by **Mr. Harshit Bawa**, has won numerous awards in the documentary section. It highlights the grim reality of human trafficking, particularly the trafficking of women. The purpose of the documentary was to raise awareness about this critical issue, exposing how human trafficking continues to take place even in states like Andhra Pradesh, despite having a high literacy rate.

The title *Traded* itself reflects the harsh reality—innocent women being *traded* for money. The documentary features interviews with three to four women who bravely shared their struggles. They revealed how traffickers lured them with false promises of employment, only to sell them off to brothels in New Delhi. Many of these women spent their entire youth as sex workers, forced to serve 70-100 men daily. They were made to wear explicit clothing, locked in rooms, and

completely cut off from the outside world. Those who resisted were brutally beaten—some even to death.

A few courageous women managed to escape with the assistance of local police stations, while others were cast out penniless after they grew old. When they pleaded for money to return home, they were coerced into recruiting more young girls for the brothels—though many refused. These brave survivors took the initiative to combat human trafficking by cooperating with the police and social workers.

Even after returning home, their struggles continued. Society stigmatized them, and they faced severe challenges in securing employment. However, with the help of the **National Rural Livelihood Mission**, they were given opportunities to rebuild their lives.

The women initially blamed their fate, but in reality, the root of the problem lay elsewhere—the government's failure to protect its citizens and the existence of morally corrupt individuals who exploit vulnerable lives for profit.

While the documentary focused on women trafficking, human trafficking as a whole involves the exploitation of men, women, and children, occurring in various forms. The film powerfully portrays how these women fought for survival and never gave up, despite facing unimaginable hardships. It takes immense courage to start anew after enduring such trauma.

This documentary serves as a wake-up call—if we witness human trafficking happening in our locality, we must take action. We must work alongside social workers and law enforcement to combat this crime. The responsibility does not lie solely with social workers; it is the duty of every citizen to raise awareness and stand up against human trafficking.

As responsible individuals, we must strive to reduce human trafficking and make India a safer and better nation for all.
